KINDERGARTEN ORIENTATION

Kindergarten Orientation continues this week, and it was a pleasure to welcome next year's Kindergarten cohort and their families to school last Thursday. The Year 5 students were very proud to be the "big buddies" for our preschool visitors, and helped guide them into classrooms and supported them in their play session with a real sense of responsibility and pride in our school.

LATE ARRIVALS

If students arrive after the 9:10am morning bell, they will be marked as absent until they arrive. This creates a "partial absence", which must be explained by a parent/carer. Late students should be accompanied to the office by their caregiver to explain the absence. If you are dropping off your child at the school gate and driving away, you must phone the office at that time to explain the absence.

The school administration staff will send emails to parents this week asking for historical partial absences which were never explained. Please reply to the email to explain each absence for our records.

Moving forward, we are starting a new SMS service, which will send a text message in the morning if your child is absent or late. You can reply via text on your mobile phone, and that is accepted as an explanation for your child's absence or lateness. This new system should streamline the process for both parents and staff. Please let us know your feedback about this service when it starts.

EARLY ARRIVALS

Teacher supervision of students starts at 8:45am each school day. Before this time, teachers are planning lessons, preparing their classroom resources, meeting as teaching teams or meeting with parents.

Parents and carers may drop students off to the playground from 8:45am each morning. If you need to leave your children before this time, for supervision and safety reasons, they need to be booked into Before School Hours Care and signed into the OOSH staff's care. Please contact info@neutralbayoosh.com.au and their staff will book your child in for the morning, if there are vacancies.

SELECTIVE HIGH SCHOOL APPLICATIONS -YEAR 7 2024

Selective high schools cater for academically gifted students with high potential who may otherwise be without sufficient classmates at their academic standard. Selective high schools help these students learn by grouping them with students of similar ability and using specialised teaching methods.

The Selective High School Placement Test will be held on **Thursday 4 May 2023**.

If you would like to have your child considered for Year 7 selective high school entry in 2024, you need to apply on the internet using a valid email address (not the student's email address).

Applications for Year 7 entry to selective high schools in 2024 open on **Tuesday 18 October 2022**. Applications will close on **Wednesday 16 November 2022**. The due date is strictly observed. Requests for late applications will be approved only under very specific and well-documented circumstances.

You must submit only ONE application for each student. The school cannot apply on your behalf.

The department's Equity Placement Model helps to make access fairer for high potential and gifted students who are currently under-represented in selective high schools. Note that school attendance is the best preparation for the Selective High School Placement Test. Schools have been asked to advise families that students with frequent and/or lengthy unjustified absences may be brought to the attention of the selective high school selection committee. Accordingly, parents who remove children from school for the purposes of preparing for the Selective High School Placement Test should be aware that the selection committee is reluctant to place students with a history of unjustified absences into a selective high school.

They played with pride and determination and they showed a "never say die" attitude, which says so much about the team and their spirit. The game finished in defeat for our boys, despite their gutsy second half "back-to-thewall" performance, with only one goal conceded.

So, in a flash, the team's journey was over. They'd gone as far as they could, but fallen at the very last hurdle. What a journey it was that took them to the final of this formidable competition.

The team members were supported on the day by numerous family members, both old and young. It will be a day anyone involved will never forget.

ETHICS TEACHERS NEEDED

Can you spare a half-hour a week? We are seeking new volunteers for 2023 so that Ethics classes can continue. We are short on volunteer teachers and without volunteers we cannot offer enough classes.

Lesson plans for Ethics classes are provided by Primary Ethics, so you don't need to create your own lessons. Ethics teachers receive full training through online modules and a comprehensive training workshop. Previous teaching experience is not required.

Each week the children discuss a topic from the approved Primary Ethics curriculum. Ethics classes are thought-provoking and give children a chance to practise skills like disagreeing respectfully with others. They will be encouraged to try to find answers to the questions posed by giving reasons, finding evidence and building on each other's ideas.

We rely on parents, grandparents and community-minded people to become volunteer Ethics teachers in their local primary school. It is a rewarding way to be involved in your local community, learn new things and help children develop skills for life. The role requires a half-hour each Wednesday morning during the school term and is a rewarding way to engage with the school community.
